






Mapping food donation policies around the world




Food Waste Law & Policy



NATIONAL LAW OR POLICY ON FOOD WASTE

Transportation and storage costs are often cited as the main expenses that manufacturers, retailers, and restaurants need to overcome to donate food. Tax incentives, including deductions and credits, can help to offset these financial inputs and make donation a more attractive, affordable option.





Explore Key Policy Issues





Date Labeling

Confusing date labels on food products are a major driver of food waste and an obstacle to food donation. Laws should differentiate between quality-and safety-based labels to reduce unnecessary waste.

Food Safety for Donations

Clear, accessible guidance on food safety–specific to donated food–is necessary to encourage donation and protect public health.

Food Waste Deterrence

Governments should establish food donation requirements or food waste deterrence laws that require that food is recovered and donated instead of going to waste.

Government Grants & Incentives

National and local grants and incentives can scale food donation, especially in countries where tax benefits are insufficient or where limited infrastructure hinders food recovery.

Lack of clear or comprehensive legal protections can result in food donors discarding safe, surplus food instead of donating it to food recovery organizations.




Food Waste in the U.S.

•66 million tons of wasted food was generated in the food retail, food service, and residential sectors.

 Most of this waste was sent to landfills.

Strategy Milestones Timeline

- ► April 2019 EPA, USDA, FDA Fiscal Year 2019-2020 Federal Interagency Strategy to reduce food waste, prioritizing six action areas in which to coordinate efforts.
- External Partner Input (e.g., ReFED Roadmap, US FLW Policy Action Plan)
- ► November 2021 National Recycling Strategy posted
- December 2021 Key FLW External Partner Input Meeting
- December 2022 Biden-Harris Administration led an Interagency Policy Committee kick off
- May 2023 Draft National Strategy to Prevent Plastic Pollution released for public comment
- December 2023 Draft National Strategy for Reducing Food Loss and Waste and Recycling Organics released for public comment



From Internal Draft to... Public Release DRAFT

- March May 2022, Multi-Agency Strategy Drafted
- May September 2022, Administration Review
 - Response to interagency and administration comments
- December 2022, Launch of a Biden-Harris Administration Food Loss and Waste Interagency Policy Committee
- October 2023, restarted interagency review of the draft strategy
- ▶ December 2023, Draft strategy announced and posted
 - ► Federal Register Notice, 60-day Public Comment Period
- ▶ Communication Plan → web content, press release
 - ► All products requiring interagency review



Draft National Strategy for Reducing Food Loss and Waste and Recycling Organics

Objectives

- Prevent the loss of food.
- 2. **Prevent** the waste of food.
- Increase the recycling rate for all organic waste.
- 4. Support policies that incentivize and encourage food loss and waste prevention and organics recycling.

Next Steps

- Interagency review of over 10,000 comments received during the public comment period
- Anticipated release later this year



 - On Jan. 5, 2023, President Biden <u>signed into law</u> the <u>Food Donation Improvement Act</u> (FDIA). The bipartisan bill passed in the Senate by unanimous consent and in the House by voice vote at the end of December. President Biden signed bill S5329 into law.
 - ▶ The FDIA amended the Bill Emerson Good Samaritan Food Donation Act.

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



















First Food Circularity Investment
